### *Our New Logo*

When I agreed to work on the logo for our society, I thought a photo of Betsy Ross sewing the American Flag would be an excellent choice. I even located a nice likeness from the Smithsonian. Except it was not original enough, and was too detailed for most applications.

In speaking with other members of the society, the decision was made to have a logo that was more inclusive to mill workers of all types. The next version looked more like a Coat of Arms, with needles as cross pieces, a spinning jenny, a loom, a thimble, and a cow hide. It became too busy, with too many colors. It was also easy to determine the thimble, but the loom and spinning jenny were just splotches on a small medallion. And although there were many good ideas on what to include from fellow society members, we needed something simple, that said "mill worker".

Living in New England, the answer was all around us, Mill Buildings! Throughout New England there are old Mill Buildings, some are wooded like Slater Mill in Rhode Island, some are stone like the mills in Willimantic, CT, but most are made with brick. See the Pryn Mill in Dayville, CT below.



A brick building made it easy to select the colors for our logo, red brick, white trim, and blue accents, the perfect colors for a "National" society.

In most mills built in the 19<sup>th</sup> century, there was a square tower section in the front of the rectangular building, although this occasionally was located elsewhere depending on the site. This section served two purposes, first it was the main entrance and stairway, but more importantly, it served as egress for the machinery needed in the mill. For buildings built before the electrification, they needed a method of getting machinery into the building. The solution was a pulley system that ran on a track along the peak of the tower. At each level there were large doors that could be opened to allow riggers to move machinery in and out of the building. The old mill buildings also required many windows for ambient light.



In honoring our textile worker ancestors, we tried to capture the essence of a typical New England mill building in our new logo. I thank everyone that contributed their input into the design. 35mm medallions with a red, white and blue ribbon are now available.
